

has planned. They feel there are so many young adults that just need a little extra help to feel independent, and somewhat in charge of their lives. They agree that our project will give those adults with development delays that independence, along with, hopefully, enrichment, and lifelong friendships. "It is one of the most worthy causes I know of, and we are proud to be a part of helping it happen," Barbara said recently.

Troy and Robin Treto from Pleasanton host a Cinco de Mayo party each year for their family and friends. In 2004, a good friend of theirs was battling Lupus, so they decided to collect donations

for the Lupus Foundation in conjunction with the party. They raised \$1,500 and a new tradition of "Party for a Cause" began! Each year they choose a charity or non-profit beneficiary for whom they not only raise money but also awareness for. Their criteria has been to find a cause that has personal significance to them, and that their donation will impact the organization. They have raised over \$55,000 over the years for organizations such as Hope Hospice, Tri-Valley Animal Rescue and the M.I.N.D Institute. They were happy to support Sunflower Hill this year, because of the many families they know it will impact and the positive community it will create.

Alan Green has been a huge donor for Sunflower Hill since we started in 2012. His nephew, Jon Elfin, is one of our founding board members. ## California's Budget Proposal Misses the Mark

The proposed state budget just released by Governor Jerry Brown is devastating the California's burgeoning population of adults with autism and special needs. Brown failed to support the Lanterman Coalition's proposal for a 10% Regional Center budget increase so community-based services can at least keep their heads above water. Community based services are critical to adults with special needs. In the East Bay alone, many programs have waiting lists that span years. Other vendors are not able to hire new staff or expand their programs due to low reimbursement rates.


The autism rate is rising. There will only be MORE adults with special needs who require day and support services post high school and transition.
